# A home for solace at the end of life

The first home specifically for short-term end-of-life care in the Joplin area is officially open and ready to serve guests.

Solace House of the Ozarks is really just a house in a residential area in the southwest corner of Joplin. Its founders purposely want it to be a homelike environment – nothing like a hospital. In that vein, those living at the home "I knew that this (a home similar




